

KILLED 3, CAPTURED 30 GERMANS.

Sam Wolff's Single-Handed Feat.

The Jewish population in Glasgow have good reasons for their proud looks these days. Their gallant sons have worked right nobly side by side with their gentile comrades in khaki. Caste is forgotten; the religion of

right against right denominates over birth-place and name. And the boys from the South Side of Glasgow have been distinguishing themselves, hence the proud looks on the faces of our Gorbals residents.

The Jewish community of Glasgow claim Signaller Sam Wolff, of Lochail's Camerons, as their own, and the young lad, just turned 21 years of age, has lately performed one of the most daring single-handed feats of the war.

Entering a house in the village of Loos, the lad from the Gorbals found himself confronted by 33 Germans. Without a moment's hesitation he sailed into the crowd, and he had killed three before the remaining 30 surrendered.

"We're Proud of Him."

"It must have been a great sight to see Sam marching in with his prisoners," a friend of the gallant Cameron remarked, "but won't we give him a welcome when he comes home again? He is bound to be honoured for his bravery; all Gorbals is ringing with the news, and although we have had no official word yet, still the news is true. Quite a number of Lochail's Camerons have written home describing Sam's great single-handed deed—we're proud of him; right proud."

"Sam doesn't say much about himself in his letters home," his mother, who resides at 132 South Portland Street, Glasgow, told me. "Only this morning I received a note from him, and the only reference he made to the Battle of Loos was that he had done something I would probably be hearing about soon."

"He Has Done His Duty."

"Some of the neighbours say he will be sure to get the D.C.M. for his bravery. Whether he does or not, I am quite proud of the fact that Sam has done his duty. I want to see him returning home in safety; medal or no medal. He is a good son; a good son, and one any mother would be proud of."

Signaller Sam Wolff joined the colours early in the present year, and is but one of 25 members of the Glasgow Young Men's Jewish Institute who enlisted. Three have been killed and two wounded. During the battle of Loos, in which Signaller Sam Wolff distinguished himself, another member of the Glasgow Young Men's Jewish Institute, Sergeant M.
